Scholarships

Local High School Students

- Student must attend one of the following high schools: Butternut, Chequamegon, Phillips, Prentice, or Rib Lake and contact their scholarship coordinator for application information.
- Applications should be submitted to the respective school within their submission deadline.
- Scholarships are only available to seniors whose parents/guardians are active PEC members.
- Two \$1,000 scholarships are available at each school.



At-Large & Non-Traditional Students

- At-large applicants are high school seniors who do not attend one of the local high schools listed above and whose parent/guardian is an active PEC member.
- Non-traditional applicants must be active PEC members, 25 years of age or older, and one of the following: did not continue or complete college after high school, attends college part-time, currently works full-time, or has children or dependents other than a spouse.
- Applications for at-large and non-traditional scholarships can be found on the PEC website and should be submitted to PEC by April 26, 2025. Two \$1,000 scholarships are available in this category.

Youth Leadership Conference (YLC)

What: YLC is a unique opportunity

for youth leaders across Wisconsin to develop their leadership skills and to learn about the purpose, operation, and scope of a cooperative.

When: July 15-17, 2025, UW-Stout in Menomonie, WI

Who: Students entering 10th, 11th, or 12th grade in fall 2025 are welcome to apply. Parent/ guardian must be an active PEC member.



Other Details: PEC will sponsor a select number of students to attend, which includes meals and transportation. Applications can be found on the PEC website and are due to PEC by **May 31, 2025.**


Electrical Safety Poster Contest

Their vital role deserves more than a day of recognition—it deserves our ongoing gratitude, and here is why.

- 1. They are expertly trained to work on power lines and equipment.
- 2. They are dedicated to safely and efficiently maintaining power.
- They have a heart for service, always looking out for the community.
- 4. They conquer heights without hesitation.
- 5. They prioritize safety every second of every day.
- 6. They answer the call day or night to restore power.
- 7. They endure it all: rain, shine and extreme weather.
- They go when they are needed, supporting communities nationwide when severe weather strikes.



IF THERE IS A DOWNED POWER LINE THINK BEFORE YOU ACT

An overhead power line can become damaged or fall due to a severe storm, car accident, public damage or other reasons. If you see a downed power line, take these actions:



Consider all power lines energized and deadly.



Stay at least 50 feet away.



Call 9-1-1 or the utility to report the downed line.

Do not approach it or try to move it with another object.



Do not get out of a vehicle or cab.



Do not approach the scene.



Warn others to stay away.



Turn around and go another way.

Even if you do not see a downed line, realize one could be hidden by storm debris, water, snow or ice.

Other things to know



Energized downed lines spread voltage through the ground or nearby <u>objects.</u>_____



If you go near a downed line, you can become electricity's path to ground.



You cannot tell if a power line is live just by looking at it.



Even if a power line appears coated, it is never safe to go near it.

While transmitting and distributing power is typically safe, extreme scenarios like downed power lines are extremely dangerous. Never approach a downed power line.
